	10	GAME: Hopping Flamingoes  The Troop is divided into two teams using the 'tallest to shortest' method. The two teams line up facing each other. Number each team from opposite ends. Remember you want a small Scout to compete against a small Scout.  When the leader calls out a number, the two Scouts with the corresponding number hop forward on one foot, with arms tucked in like a flamingo. Each tries to bump their opponent over. The first Scout to put a foot down or fall over is the loser.  Keep calling numbers to create rotation.	None	
	20	ACTIVITY ONE: Under the hot African sun  NB: This activity must be run outdoors  Objective: Each Patrol is to construct a shelter out of any material they can find or, alternatively, issue each Patrol with suitable equipment (staves, ropes, tarpaulin) with which to build a shelter.  Briefing: To be given to the Patrol Leader  Your Patrol has become lost while hiking in the African desert, your food and water supplies are running short, and the Patrol Leader has decided that during the hottest time of the day you need to seek shelter.  Construct a shelter out of any items you can find at your Troop meeting place. Remember your entire Patrol must be able to fit under the shelter.	Staves; ropes; tarpaulin

	20	ACTIVITY TWO: When it rains in Africa, it pours  NB: This activity must be run outdoors  Objective: The Scouts are to make their shelters waterproof, after the given time the Patrol must enter the shelters and Scouters can drip water from the buckets onto the shelters to see if they are waterproof.  Briefing: To be given to the Patrol Leader  Your Patrol has successfully constructed their shelter from the sun. But, as we all know, on the hottest of South African days the heat is often followed by a thunderstorm. Your Patrol now has ten minutes to make sure their shelters are as waterproof as possible before the rain starts.	Buckets; water
